Years 3/4 - Stig of the Dump by Clive King

Barney is a solitary eight-year-old, given to wandering off by himself. One day he tumbles over, lands in a sort of cave, and meets somebody with shaggy hair wearing a rabbit-skin and speaking in grunts. He names him Stig. They together raid the rubbish dump at the bottom of the pit, improve Stig's cave dwelling, and enjoy a series of adventures...

Years 5/6 - The Silver Sword by Ian Serraillier is an unforgettable World War II survival story. Although the silver sword was only a paper knife, it became the symbol of hope and courage which kept the Balicki children and their orphan friend Jan alive through the four years of occupation when they had to fend for themselves. And afterwards it inspired them to keep going on the exhausting and dangerous journey from war-torn Poland to Switzerland, where they hoped to find their parents. Based on true accounts, this is a moving story of life during and after the Second World War.

Maths Answers

Years 3/4

I think of a number, divide it by 7 and add 15. The answer is 23. What is my number?

To work this out, we do the calculation backwards.

23 - 15 = 8

8 x 7 = 56

Therefore, the number I think of is 56

Yea<u>rs 5/6</u>

What is 4/5 (four fifths) of 95?

First, we work out 1/5 of 95 by dividing 95 by 5

 $95 \div 5 = 19$

To find out fourth fifths, we must multiply this answer by 4

19 x 4 = 76

Therefore, 76 is fourth fifths of 95
