Years 3 & 4 Find the mean of these numbers

- 20 + 19 + 21 = 60
 60 ÷ 3 = 20
 Therefore, the mean is 20
- 2) 1 + 9 + 11 + 5 + 7 + 3 = 36
 36 ÷ 6 = 6
 Therefore, the mean is 6
- 3) 8 + 0 + 3 + 9 + 4 + 6 = 30

 $30 \div 6 = 5$ Therefore, the mean is 5
