### LETTER FROM MS KATTIRTZI, HEADTEACHER

More Poetry! Poetry seems to reign at Kendrick at the moment and there has been another notable success for a Kendrick student, Shravya, who came third in the Hampshire Art Poets Competition run by Hampshire Cultural Trust and Winchester Poetry Festival. There seems to be such an interest in poetry that we have decided to share with you the poem of the week in this Weekly Update which I hope you will enjoy reading. Elsewhere in the school, A Level Geographers returned from their Field Trip, Biologists across the school have been taking part in Biology Week and so many other activities continue to take place. I attended an assembly on the mentoring programme launched for Years 11 and 12 students, where a sixth form student will work alongside a Year 11 student to support them through the period of GCSEs, as well as the decision-making process for A Levels and Sixth Form studies. At another assembly with Year 7, Ms Grice spoke to the students about an important theme we develop with students at this stage about learning to learn, an approach that can help students get into good learning habits early on in their life at Kendrick. This will be developed further with a study skills session for Year 7 next term. As a reminder to parents and students of clubs and societies available to everyone, here is the updated list for 2023-24. This lists all the extracurricular activities available, as well as what takes place daily. As I have said before some of these are run by teachers, some by senior students.

This week at a CPD session with our teachers, I spoke briefly about how things have been this term. It is important to view education both from a wider perspective as well as what goes on at Kendrick. From the latter point of view there is a lot to celebrate and be grateful for this term. I mentioned that we returned to school in September fully staffed and with the largest cohort of students ever, welcoming 128 students in Year 7 and 153 students in Year 12. We didn't have RACC, the real worry and concern there was for schools up and down the country; our Cedars project had got underway; our GCSE and A Level results were amazing with over 90% of our Year 13 students able to go onto their preferred choices of university and courses. We celebrated 146 years of girls' education on School Birthday and continue to highlight and be inspired by significant women around us, most recently in Black History month. And daily we celebrate and are constantly in awe of what our students do whether it being writing pieces of profound poetry, tackling enormously difficult maths and science problems, speaking different languages, writing erudite essays, or just the joy and pleasure they can give us as students in lessons. I have observed several lessons this term and can see that there is a joy and engagement in learning at all levels in the school, and there are good relationships and interactions that exist between students and staff every day. Sometimes we can take all these things for granted and focus on the little things that niggle and annoy us rather than what is really happening.

I would like to thank staff and students for all their efforts and hard work. Also, parents, we appreciate and understand the vital role you play in how school life works, and I thank you for the support and encouragement you give us. I hope the messages we send to you every week about safeguarding and mental health and wellbeing are read and looked at so that you feel there is support for you in your parenting responsibilities of our young people. The information is there for you to use as and when you need it, so please be aware of what there is available for the times when either you or a family member needs it.

It has been a long and busy term; I hear and see how tired people are feeling. I encourage all students and staff to have good break from schoolwork this holiday, finding things to do things for their own pleasure and at their own pace. It is important that we restore and recharge ourselves for the winter months ahead and hope that things outside of our control are a little calmer by the time we return.

A free show about County Lines, aimed at Year 6 and above is touring the country is coming to the Select Car Leasing Stadium in Reading on Saturday 28 October at 10.30am & 1.30pm.

CODE, presented by Justice in Motion, tells the story of a young person who falls prey to a gang and is groomed and coerced to start drug running. The show includes stunt bike riders, parkour athletes, skateboarders, theatre performers and a rap artist.

This show is being brought to Reading by the *Community Safety Partnership* and *Safer Streets 4*. It is supported by *Reading Borough Council*, <u>Dance Reading</u> and <u>Reading Football Club</u> as a continuation of 'Olly's Work', started with the Armoured Heart earlier this year. This sculpture was created in partnership with young people to raise awareness of the dangers of carrying a knife.

In its simplest form, self-care is just the little things we do to look after our own mental health. It's about trying to listen to how we are feeling and understanding what we need, even if it's difficult, so we can care for ourselves.

This could mean taking a timeout when we're feeling overwhelmed; it could mean making time to do an activity that we know makes us feel good; or it could be as simple as making sure to do the basics like eating and sleeping well when we're struggling.

#### **NO STOPPING IN EAST STREET**

Please can we remind all parents and carers that there is **no stopping or parking on East Street at any time.** We have had a number of complaints from our own parents and members of the public, about parking on the pavement in East Street to drop off students, resulting in pedestrians, including our students, having to walk on the road which is very dangerous. We are working with the Local Authority to install no stopping signs and red lines on East Street because of the issues that a few parents are creating.
