Kendrick School - Weekly Update Friday 10th November 2023

LETTER FROM MS KATTIRTZI, HEADTEACHER

It has been a busy week, particularly for our Year 11 students who on Tuesday had a Post 16 Careers Conference at school and last night attended our Sixth Form Open Day event. As well as a one-to-one interview with a careers officer, Year 11 students are beginning to make plans for their studies after GCSE. Most of our Year 11 students stay at Kendrick to study A Levels, and they are joined by up to 50 students from other schools in our local area. The event last night was very well attended and prospective parents and students were ablet to visit subject areas and speak to teachers to find out about the courses we offer at A Level. Our Sixth Form students were present and guided families around the school and answered questions that people had. Talks by me, Mrs Hearn, Head of Sixth Form, and members of the Kendrick Student Leadership Team complemented the tours and provided a rounded picture of the sixth form life at Kendrick. Kendrick School Year 11 students have been given information on how to submit their subject choices for Year 12 and the timescales involved. This morning we had a whole school assembly, to mark Remembrance Day which is tomorrow, Saturday 11th November. As always, I spoke to the students about Remembrance Day and the work of the Royal British Legion who support serving and former service men and women of the British Armed Forces. I also talked about conflicts and how they arise, including the conflicts that we are seeing and hearing about every day in Middle East and Ukraine. Students in the 6th Form, Medha, Nethra, Lekhana and Sneha, members of the Curriculum and Current Affairs Committee, spoke about the theme of this year's Remembrance Day, which is **Service** and the service that people have given during times of war and conflict. They spoke and explained the symbols of Remembrance, the red poppy, but also other poppies that can be are worn - purple, black, and white poppies and what these poppies represent. It can be difficult for young people to understand and appreciate the issues that relate to war and the personal, social, economic, and political consequences of conflict. Here are some <u>links</u> to help talk to your child about war and conflict.

To finish the assembly, I spent a few moments reflecting on how our own everyday actions and behaviours should try to be kind, peaceful, tolerant, and understanding and how we must always endeavour to resolve conflicts that we have in our lives. I suggested that at Kendrick there are things we can do as a community to promote and uphold peace in our lives. We can remember those who have died in war, we can reflect and consider that war is an argument/disagreement on a major scale that has not been resolved. We can look at what unresolved conflicts and arguments we have with each other and how we can try to resolve these peacefully and amicably. We can be the person that tries to keep the peace in disagreements and tries to find common ground. We can 'call out' people when they are being mean or unkind to others. We can recognise and appreciate the warmth and kindness of others and be welcoming to people who join our community. We can support the charities and organisations that work in countries where war exists.

To start and end the assembly we heard some beautiful piano music, played by Ursula in Year 12 and Yan and Isabelle in Year 10. At 11.00am, our community stopped for two minutes' silence and to listen to Olwen in Year 13 play The Last Post.

There is a lot of information and links in the Weekly Update about being kind to each other and to oneself in preparation for Anti- Bullying Week next week. Students in Years 7-11 also received assemblies on Anti-Bulling this week.

With these thoughts in mind, I wish you all a peaceful weekend. For people celebrating Diwali on Sunday, I wish you well as you celebrate the beautiful Festival of Lights with your family.

The Anti-Bullying Alliance call to action is:

"Too often, we are silent when we see bullying take place, silent about the hurt bullying causes, and silent when we hear bullying dismissed as 'just banter'. It doesn't have to be this way.

Of course, we won't like everyone and we don't always agree, but we can choose respect and unity.

This Anti-Bullying Week let's come together to have discussions about what bullying means to us, how banter can turn into something more hurtful, and what we can do to stop bullying. Together, we can make a difference and take a stand against bullying.

From the playground to Parliament, and from our phones to our homes, let's make a noise about bullying".

Microtransactions figure in the business model of many game and app developers, allowing them to bring in ongoing revenue as users continue to

pay for extra features and content; even software that's initially free to download can be monetised in this way. It's a system which has featured in many of younger gamers' perennial favourite franchises, from Fortnite to FIFA.

As well as encouraging regular spending, however, microtransactions – especially the increasingly common use of loot boxes – have also been scrutinised for what many argue is a resemblance to gambling, with the potential to foster addictive behaviours. This guide tells parents and carers what they need to know about microtransactions.

WHAT IS KINDNESS?

SAY THANK YOU.

People are continually learning right and wrong through associative learning. Positive reinforcement helps people want to do more good deeds and reminds people to act with intention.
