LETTER FROM MS KATTIRTZI, HEADTEACHER

I was in a lesson today when a teacher gave students a thoughtful quotation to consider. Said by Martin Luther King the words were 'you don't have to see the whole staircase, just take the first step'. It was a great motivational thought that inspired the students in what they were doing and made me reflect on what we do every day in school. Working with young people is about motivating and encouraging them to reach their potential, often persuading them to think they can do something which they are worried or too scared to consider. Sometimes they want to see where they are going before taking that first step and sometimes they can trust the people around them to help them take that first step. This idea suggests that with belief in your ability and with the support of the people around you, one can eventually get to your destination. I expect in the context of Dr King's life's work, which was to eradicate discrimination and segregation in America in the 1960s, this was a powerful thought intended to provide people with hope and motivation that that one day they would reach their destination in the fight for Civil Rights. This motivational thought helped the Year 7 students in their lesson this morning, as did the quiet conversation I overheard between a teacher and a sixth form student this morning encouraging and advising the student to complete their work on time to meet a deadline. On Tuesday morning 10SA, in their assembly, gave advice to their fellow students about how to manage stress in their work, particularly when revising for tests and how to manage these regular occurrences without being overwhelmed. Every day at school our students are being encouraged, motivated, and supported to climb the 'staircase' they may be facing, taking just one step at a time, and trusting in those around them.

Being the penultimate week of Term 3 means there is much going on at school that needs to get finished before we take a break at the end of next week. Rehearsals for House Drama next week are excitedly taking place with many students using all their free time to participate in this special event. Over 185 tickets have been sold and I believe there are just a few left if you have not yet secured a seat for the event next Thursday 8th February. Please go on to ParentPay to buy these. I have just seen the programmes that each of the houses has put together for their individual play which makes me very excited about what we are going to see next week. Well done and thank you to everyone involved in the event so far.

Today there is much excitement amongst Year 7 and 8 students in anticipation of a KPS hosted Disco this evening. In addition, this week Year 8 students enjoyed a morning with employers led by our careers' consultants Learning to Work, listening to a variety of employers under the heading *People Like me*. Examining skills and abilities they already have and can demonstrate in school, students considered how these skills and qualities can be developed in the workplace for the future. This event and others are part of the Careers Education that students receive at school. I am looking forward to speaking to Year 8 parents next week at the KPS hosted drop-in to see how life for them is progressing in school.

Some information has been sent to students and parents about *Time to Talk Day,* an initiative encouraging students to share a problem they may have, but cannot solve themselves, with a trusted adult. In addition, we are highlighting Internet Safety Day next week to raise awareness of online safety which we cannot underestimate the importance of with our students. Please read and discuss these topics and others with your children as we share such information with you. Below there is some useful information about deepfakes, a form of artificial intelligence that creates images of fake events and therefore misinformation.

DEEP FAKES

Deepfakes use a form of artificial intelligence called deep learning to make images of fake events, hence the name deepfake. Police forces have highlighted concerns raised by schools of children creating deepfakes in order to bully other students. 96% of deepfakes are found to be pornographic (with someone's face onto a pornographic video), deepfakes may also make politicians appear to say something they haven't. Such technology may influence what children perceive to be true online, the technology is likely to continue to improve making it very challenging to identify fake content online.

How to deal with the impacts of misinformation

If your child is active online, there's a good chance that they've come across misinformation. Give them the tools to effectively deal with it and get support.

Fact-check information together

If your child has fallen for false information, they might feel embarrassed. So, take the time to review the misinformation with them. Discuss what made them think it was real, and then show them the signs that it was false. Additionally, show them what you would do to check if the information was true. Doing this exercise together can help them critically assess information in the future.

Encourage them to fix their mistakes

If your child shared misinformation with others, encourage them to take ownership of that mistake. They could make a follow up post (if on social media) to say that what they shared was false. Additionally, they could share the correct information. It's important that they delete the misinformation where possible.

Offer support for their wellbeing

In severe cases such as scams or impacts on body image, children might need additional support. This could include talking with a counsellor or getting support from your child's school.

Help them report misleading or false content

The platforms or apps your child uses likely have policies on misleading content. Some policies are more robust than others and will take down such content while others require a little more thought.

If your child comes across misinformation or misleading content, they should report it. Show them how to do this or do it with them. Even if they aren't sure, the moderation team can assess the content to make the decision.

TALKING TO A YOUNG PERSON ABOUT THEIR MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLBEING

Time to Talk Day is an annual awareness day held at the beginning of February. It's a day for us all to start a conversation about mental health. Talking about mental health isn't easy. But a conversation has the power to change lives. Time to Talk Day is run by Mind and Rethink Mental Illness, in partnership with the Co-op.

Giving children and young people opportunities to open up is one of the biggest things that parents and carers can do to support their wellbeing. It can be easy to forget the simple power of sharing what we're going through and feeling heard. But even though you can't fix everything when your child is struggling, you can make them feel seen and understood – and this in itself can make them feel more able to cope.

Talking about how they are, how their day has been and what's on their mind as part of everyday family life shows your child that you're interested in them and want to listen. It also supports them to practise thinking and talking about their feelings, helping them to get to know themselves and what they need.

But talking isn't always easy. You might feel like you don't know where to start, when a 'good time' is, or how your young person will react. Or, you might be worried about making things worse or saying the wrong thing. If this is the case, try to remember that your child doesn't need you to always get it right - they just need to know you're there.
