Weekly Letter from Ms Kattirtzi, Headteacher

A 'historic' event took place at Kendrick this week when **Sc2 was dismantled** from its place in the carpark after having served us so well for almost 20 years. It was originally located in the quad that now houses the Faraday Labs and was a fully functioning laboratory, hence its name Science 2. Then it was moved to its current location in 2008 where it has been a most useful assembly and meeting centre. I am told the students in the rooms closest to it found it fascinating as the structure was slowly and carefully taken down. Shortly, other big developments to the building project will be taking place as elements of the new structure will be brought into school and assembled on site.

We launched our **Head Girl Team** elections last week and we are all looking forward to hearing the 48 Year 12 students who have put themselves forward to be considered for election. The Hustings will be on Monday 27th January followed by the voting process and interviews of the top 10 students will take place in the penultimate week of this term after which we will be able to announce the new team. This is an excellent experience and opportunity for the students as they have to consider what contribution they can make to the school should they be elected. Also what skills and attributes they can offer as a team whose main role is to lead the student body, as well as work with staff in the school. Every year we are impressed by the display of ideas and innovation shown by the nominees and the commitment and dedication they show to their school.

Now that the Year 11 mocks are over we are able to resume our usual routine of assemblies many of which take place in the Hall. Earlier in the week, Year 10 were introduced to the Work Experience programme they will be undertaking at the end of June, which was detailed to parents last October at the Year 10 Information Evening. Yesterday, 9N took the assembly for Year 9 and chose the theme of vaccinations and spoke knowledgeably about the different vaccinations there are and what they serve. Looking to the past as well as to the future, they made some intelligent observations about the importance of vaccines. At the other end of the school, Year 7 led by Mme Hulley, discussed the concerns that can arise from misuse and overuse of social media. This is a topic of interest to everyone and last week a parent sent me a report that has just been published entitled **Technology use and its impact on mental health of children and young people**. Finally at this morning's **Sixth Form assembly**, a group of Year 13 spoke about Islamophobia and the countless ways Muslims are portrayed wrongly and unfairly in the media and in TV programmes. They also spoke about the increasing number of attacks, physical and verbal, on Muslims on the streets of our town and cities, including Reading, as well as on university campuses. This theme of challenging prejudice and discrimination is something we talk about a lot at Kendrick and I am most encouraged when our own students are able to articulate the messages so well and encourage others to reflect on behaviours of people in our society. With Holocaust Memorial Day next Monday, this was an appropriate theme to end our week and I hope will encourage more reflection over weekend. If the election is contested, a poll by secret ballot will be held. The election will be conducted electronically and been designed to ensure that the election is secret and anonymous, is limited to one vote per person and ensures that only those entitled to vote can take part in the election.

If you do not wish to participate in the election via this method, please contact the Clerk to the Governing Body to make arrangements for a ballot paper to be posted to you and to ensure you are excluded from the online voting system.

The election period will commence at midday on **Thursday 30**th **January** and will close at midday on **Thursday 6**th **February 2020.** The vote will be counted at 12.15pm on that day and the results will be published as soon as possible thereafter.

Performer Series 3 - Piano Masterclass with Dr Nigel Wilkinson – Wednesday 12th February, Masterclass at 4pm, Concert at 6.30pm

Students are invited to attend a Piano Masterclass with Dr Nigel Wilkinson. He has worked as a senior producer for BBC Radio 3 for many years and now works mainly as a pianist, teacher, ABRSM examiner and adjudicator for events such as BBC Young Musician of the Year and Music for Youth. During this event, selected students will be able to work with Dr Wilkinson to develop their pieces in a masterclass fashion in which they receive feedback and expert tips on how to improve their technique. There will also be a brief discussion about how to prepare for practical examinations and an informal Q+A session in which anyone can ask questions. This will culminate in a discussion and performance from Dr Wilkinson and the masterclass students.

All students learning the piano, regardless of ability, are invited to sign up for this event. This is free for Kendrick students but those attending from other schools will be charged a small fee of £5 to help cover costs. The concert itself will also cost £5 per adult and children may enter for free.

2020 Walter Hussey Composition Competition

We have been sent the information below from Reading Phoenix Choir

The 2020 competition follows Reading Phoenix Choir's aim of working with young people and is for composers aged between 16 and 24. With a 1st prize of £500 and a 2nd prize of £200, a line-up of top judges from the choral and composition world and no entry fee, the Walter Hussey Composition Competition continues to be one of the leading choral composition competitions of our time. The competition is named in honour of Walter Hussey, Dean of Chichester Cathedral from 1955 to 1977, who commissioned many choral works throughout his lifetime. Entry for the 2020 competition will start in January 2020, with a deadline for entries of 30th June 2020. The winner is expected to be chosen by December 2020 and the winning piece will receive its world premiere in March 2021.

The 2020 Walter Hussey Composition Competition is being promoted by Reading Phoenix Choir and having celebrated its 50th anniversary season in 2019, the theme for the competition is both encouraging the musicians of the future and looking forwards, and is therefore 'New Horizons'.


