LETTER FROM MS KATTIRTZI, HEADTEACHER

The Candidate was the theme of last night's House Drama productions which all three Houses interpreted so well. Palmer interpreted the theme as a political and social statement about the importance of girls' education, something which resonates with so many of us. Cedars chose to view the idea as a fantasy adventure with a physical representation of a dragon being slayed by the prince and his friends, making the point of the importance of support and teamwork. Sidmouth chose to explore a current and relevant issue about some of the consequences of social media and the manipulation of personal data, which at moments had the audience on the edge of their seats with suspense. The judging must have been very difficult for our invited adjudicator, Hilda Harper from the Reading Rep Theatre but her very good and balanced review of all three productions resulted in Cedars House being the winning play. Well done to Cedars for being House Drama winners 2024! All three houses made an outstanding effort demonstrating teamwork, creativity and enjoyment in planning and presenting such great plays. Many thanks to Miss Hyde who led and organised the event and provided such enthusiasm and inspiration to the students in their work.

An assembly to KS3 and 4 students on the topic of Young Carers has been presented in the last couple of days. This is to raise awareness of this issue and for us to know if any of our students are carers for family members at home. We have asked students to tell us if they feel their home situation requires them to be a carer so that we can support them. If parents feel that this applies to their child, please email studentwelfare@kendrick.reading.sch.uk to let us know. More information will be sent to parents about Young Carers next term. This morning an assembly was presented to Year 12 to introduce them to the process of electing the Kendrick Student Leaders 2024-25, an opportunity for a group of 18 students to take on a leadership role in school. Details of the roles available to students and the timeline of events over the next term, were clearly explained. This group of students is the essential student voice of Kendrick School, who coupled with School Council, elected students from Key Stage 3 and 4, represent the student body at Kendrick.

February is LGBT History month and to that end a super display has been put up in the library. Under the theme *Medicine - #UndertheScope*, the display celebrates LGBT+ peoples' contribution in the field of medicine and healthcare over time. Focusing on two women who had an impact in these areas, Sophie Jex-Blake and Margaret Stacey, the <u>display</u> highlights their contributions, as well as challenges they faced.

Popping into the <u>library</u> this morning, I found it, as always, very busy and active. A group of Year 9 students with their teacher were searching the shelves for books to borrow over the holiday. Scanning the display walls, these students were being directed to the information which has recently been put-up featuring book lists for the different age groups: 11 books for 11 year-olds, 12 books for 12 year-olds, up to 18 books for 18 year-olds. These books have been selected by our Librarians, Mrs Cavaciuti and Mrs Williamson, and Mr Dilley, Head of English, who have recommended age-appropriate books for students to read. I have started to look at these book lists and intend to read one from each year group over the next few months. Please look at the titles and displays <u>here</u> and share with other young people you know. One can never read enough and when I am asked by parents how they can help their child in their studies, my answer is always, encourage them to read, both for pleasure and relaxation, as well as for acquiring knowledge and developing understanding.

This week we have been highlighting Safer Internet Day and Children's Mental Health Week. Both events have resulted in a lot of information being sent to staff, students and parents and reiterated again in the update below. Please read and discuss with your child any matter that you think is appropriate. Based on the mental health themes,

Time to Talk and Express yourself Day, and to mark the end of another busy term, our Student Wellbeing Ambassadors put on a karaoke session in the Hall which seemed a lot of fun! Fun can come in all shapes and forms, and I was told about a fun weekend our CCF RAF group took part in. Competing in Regional Air Squadron Competition in Blandford Forum in Dorset, accompanied by Mrs White, the CCF team, composed of Kendrick and Reading School students, came second in a competition of 12 South West schools. Very well done to our students and Reading School for this achievement and for the trophy they were given. Please read the article here. Two trips have gone off this week: one on Monday for Art students to the Ashmoleon Museum in Oxford and one today to the British Museum for Classics students. Sometimes if parents are looking for things to do with their children in the holidays a visit to a place of interest, like a museum is always fun and interesting for everyone and there are many of these on our doorstep.

Finally, thank you to students and staff for their tremendous efforts this term. Although a short term, it has still been intense and fast paced. I hope that everyone takes time to relax and refresh and set aside schoolwork. Obviously for our Year 13 students who come back to mocks after half term this may not be the case, but I do hope everyone does prioritise some rest and relaxation over the next few days.

LEAVING CHILDREN AT HOME ALONE

There is no legal age limit for leaving a child on their own, but it's an offence to leave a child alone if this puts them at risk. Parents/carers can be prosecuted for neglect if it is judged that they placed a child at risk by leaving them home alone.

How mature the child is

It is important to consider the child's maturity. It might be acceptable to leave a mature 12-year-old alone, but not a 13 year old or older who isn't mature and may put themselves or others at risk of harm.

A child should never be left at home alone if they do not feel comfortable with this, regardless of their age. If a child has additional needs, these should be considered when leaving them at home alone or with an older sibling. The National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children (NSPCC) advises that:

- babies, toddlers and very young children should never be left alone
- children under the age of 12 are rarely mature enough to cope in an emergency and should not be left at home alone for a long period of time
- children under the age of 16 should not be left alone overnight
- NSPCC website(external link opens in a new window / tab)

Preparation before leaving your child alone

If you intend leave your child home alone, you should:

- leave a contact phone number and make sure you can answer it right away
- leave a separate contact list of people you trust, in case your child can't contact you
- talk to your child before you leave about how to stay safe, and tell them not to open the door or invite strangers into the house
- make sure dangerous objects like matches and knives are out of reach, and that all medicines (drugs) and dangerous chemicals are in a locked cupboard
- leave clear instructions on and practise what to do in case of an emergency (like a fire)
- check in on your child regularly while you are out until they have built up confidence
- make sure your child knows how to be safe online while you are out
- tell them what time you will be back, and don't be late
- set some basic rules about what they can and can't do while you are out
- teach them basic first aid
- make sure they have access to adequate food and drink
- if children have the freedom to use a toaster or microwave to heat food make sure they know how to do so safely; if bread is stuck in a toaster always turn it off at the wall and never poke a knife or fork into the toaster, use wooden or plastic tongs; never place silver rimmed plates or bowls into the microwave and always look at the bottom to see if it is microwave safe, never place tinfoil or cutlery into the microwave
- make sure that the young person does not bring other friends into your house without your permission
- make sure you have no planned deliveries to the house during this time

It's important to make sure that your child is happy and safe to be left alone. If they aren't confident about being left alone, you need to make other arrangements or have someone you trust to look after them.


