## LETTER FROM MS KATTIRTZI, HEADTEACHER

I hope that everyone had a good half term. We finished last term with the closure of the school on Friday 18<sup>th</sup> February due to the storms and high winds. Thank you again to everyone for your response which enabled staff and students to work from home which I believe was very effective. Parts of the school did sustain some damage: tiles came off the roof of Cedars and a walkway cover was also blown off. The damage is being assessed and hopefully repairs will take place soon.

We start Term 4 with a lot of activities and events for students, as well as the Teacher Assessments Grades (TAGs) for students in Years 11 and 13. Year 13 finish their week of TAGs today and Year 11 have their second session of TAGs at the end of the term, week beginning 4<sup>th</sup> April. Speaking with parents of Year 11 students last night at the KPS hosted drop-in, there is understandably some anxiety amongst parents and students about the TAGs and the time available for revision alongside normal lessons. Teachers will be informing students of the content of their TAGs in the next couple of weeks if they have not done so already, and as always there will be support and guidance for the students.

Elsewhere in the school, a series of lively activities continue to take place. I mentioned the list below to you before half term. In addition, a group of staff have met to begin to discuss ways in which we can begin to mark the Queen's Platinum Jubilee later in the year. Ideas from students have been gathered and we hope to identify a day in July when we can celebrate this momentous occasion.

- An English and Latin Writing competition
- International Women's Day on 8th March with theme being 'Break the bias'
- A visiting speaker and former teacher at Kendrick, Mrs Angela Strach, who is the daughter of a Holocaust Survivor's, on 10<sup>th</sup> March
- Comic Relief Day on 18<sup>th</sup> March with many fun activities being planned by School Council and the Kendrick Student Leaders
- KPS planned events, including the possibility of Film Nights for Years 7 and 8
- Another edition of the Gazette

The news from Ukraine cannot but cast a huge shadow on everyone's life. It is with disbelief that we have witnessed events unfold in Ukraine which have devastated the lives of the people, caused hundreds of deaths and left millions of people displaced. The escalation to the bombing of nuclear sites yesterday is a most disturbing development and makes everyone throughout the world fear for the safety of the people in that region and for the entire world. The response of the international community has been swift with economic, political, social and cultural sanctions, plus the huge outpouring of emotion and sympathy for the people of Ukraine. At Kendrick, students immediately began to organise a collection for Ukrainian refugees and I have received a number of emails from students who want to mobilise the strength that we may have as individuals to help the situation. To that end we are liaising with the Ukrainian Community Centre which is in fact on Sidmouth Street and we will endeavour to do what we can to support the humanitarian effort in this conflict. I am aware of students whose families originate from these regions and who have families and friends in Ukraine and Russia and who at this moment are feeling extremely anxious. Teachers have been sent resources to use with students about comprehending and discussing war and conflict. In

#### **SAFEGUARDING – EMOTIONAL ABUSE**

Emotional abuse is often a part of other kinds of <u>abuse</u>, which means it can be difficult to <u>spot the signs</u> or tell the difference, though it can also happen on its own.

#### Emotional abuse includes:

- humiliating or constantly criticising a child
- threatening, shouting at a child or calling them names
- making the child the subject of jokes, or using sarcasm to hurt a child
- blaming and scapegoating
- making a child perform degrading acts
- not recognising a child's own individuality or trying to control their lives
- pushing a child too hard or not recognising their limitations
- exposing a child to upsetting events or situations, like domestic abuse or drug taking
- failing to promote a child's social development
- not allowing them to have friends
- persistently ignoring them
- being absent
- manipulating a child
- never saying anything kind, expressing positive feelings or congratulating a child on successes
- never showing any emotions in interactions with a child, also known as emotional neglect.

#### **BREAKFAST CLUB**

The Canteen provide a Breakfast Club every day between 7.50am and 8.20am where students can buy hot drinks, cereal bars, Danish pastries and hash browns.

#### **COVID UPDATE**

Students no longer need to test twice a week but should take a LFD test if they have COVID symptoms or have been in close contact with someone who has tested positive. If their test is positive they should stay at home and self-isolate for 10 days. However, students can take a LFD test from 5 days after their symptoms started (or the day the test was taken if they did not have symptoms) followed by another LFD test the next day. If both these test results are negative, and the student does not have a high temperature, they can safely return to their normal routine. All students have been given a pack of tests to take home.
