Kendrick School - Weekly Update Friday 28th April 2023

LETTER FROM MS KATTIRTZI, HEADTEACHER

Our Open Day events took place this week when Year 5 children and parents came to visit our school, interact with student guides and hear some talks from me and students explaining to them what it is like at Kendrick and the kind of school that we are. Over 800 children and their families visited us over five sessions and the comments we have received so far are that they appreciated and enjoyed their visit. As well as telling them about what we do here, what we learn, our buildings and facilities, I always convey the important message that I want to give to all children and, of course, girls in particular, that their education matters. We know that up to 1000 children will apply for our test this September but only 128 will be given a place, so I say to them strongly and emphatically, if you do not get into Kendrick, it doesn't mean you are a failure, you can go on to succeed in another school if you demonstrate determination and passion and have ambitions and dreams. The students who spoke with me on the stage gave some super speeches portraying their school as a friendly, happy environment which was great to listen to. Thank you the staff who organised the events with minimum disruption to the to the rest of the school.

Today we welcome our governors to school for our annual Governor Day Strategy Day when we will examine strategic themes about the school and its future. The day will be divided into through parts with the first focusing on Learning and Teaching, then a review of our strategic intent as set out in the Kendrick School Development Plan. A local Headteacher will speak to us and about his vision of SEND education in Reading and how this may impact on other schools in Reading, and in the afternoon, we will be discussing governor roles, engagement and training. Last year when we had this event, the DfE was in the process of publishing a White Paper on schools which had some very specific plans for schools for the future, in particular the desire that all schools should be in Multi Academy Trust by 2030. This document has since been rescinded and there seems to be a bit of a vacuum in government planning and thinking at the moment. Our discussions on our Governor Strategy Day are intended to help us be prepared for some of the intentions the government may have on the future of schools. As I said last year, my strategic intent for our school is and has always been that Kendrick remains a sustainable school, that it continues to be an outstanding school and a beacon of girls' education; it retains its unique and special ethos that nurtures and values everyone in its community. Also, that we remain a school that is outward looking, collaboratively and relevant in our community encouraging greater local participation and access to our school. Our expansion programme which started in 2020 and will be going into its fourth year this September is evidence of that intent.

SAFEGUARDING – GOING OUT OR STAYING HOME ALONE

As your child gets older, it's likely they'll want a bit more independence or want to explore alone during the holidays and weekends. But are they ready to stay home or go out alone?

Is it legal to leave a child home alone?

A child who isn't old enough or who doesn't feel comfortable should never be left home alone. If this is the case, it's best to look into childcare options that might work for your family. Read the NSPCC advice via this <u>link</u>. There's no legal age a child can be left home alone, but it's against the law to leave a child alone if it puts them at risk1. Every child matures differently, so it would be almost impossible to have a "one size fits all" law.

QUIZ – Is my child ready to be home or out alone?

Deciding when it's safe for your child to be left home, or go out on their own can be difficult. There are so many things to think about – including whether your child feels comfortable and ready. This <u>quiz</u> is designed to help reduce that worry, by helping you make the right decision for you and your child.

What age can a child be left home alone?

Learning to be independent is an important part of growing up. Between work, appointments and other family commitments – every parent will have to leave their child home alone at some point so it's good to have a plan in place. Every child is different so build up their independence at their pace – and check in with them to make sure they feel safe.

Keep talking to your child. Whether they're 12 years old or almost 18 years old, there might be reasons that they don't feel safe in the house alone. Just because your child is older doesn't necessarily mean they're ready to look after themselves or know what to do in an emergency. It can help to go over the ground rules and remind them how to stay safe at home.

Remember – you should never leave a child home alone if they don't feel ready, or if you don't feel they're ready. Sometimes it's just better to leave them with someone – particularly if they're nervous or have complex needs.

MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLBEING – BUILDING CONFIDENCE AND SELF-ESTEEM

Our wellbeing theme for Term 5 is Building Confidence and Self Esteem.

Self-esteem is how you think and feel about yourself. Being confident means being comfortable with how you look and how you feel. And it means feeling good about yourself, your abilities and your thoughts.

Building your confidence and self-esteem can take time and practice. And what helps you now may not be the same thing as what helps in the future. But there's lots of things you can do to improve the way you feel about yourself and your abilities.

It might feel like a big step to make changes. Start by trying a couple of new things each week, until you find what works for you. Go at your own pace and don't put too much pressure on yourself – small changes can make a big difference.

One way is to be kind to yourself.

- Recognise and challenge your unkind thoughts. Try to do this by talking to yourself as you would to a good friend. You could ask yourself: 'How might someone else see this?', 'Is there anything that suggests this might not happen?', or 'What would I say to a friend who was thinking this?' Answering these questions may help you to think more rationally and calmly.
- Remember it's okay to make mistakes. It's also important to forgive yourself when you do make a mistake.
- Avoid comparing yourself to others. For example, try to remember that the pictures people share on social media have been carefully chosen or filtered. And they often don't show what people's actual lives are like.
- Repeat positive statements to yourself. For example, you could say 'I am enough' or 'I am worth it' to yourself in the mirror every morning.

These things might not always feel easy, but they can be powerful ways to help change how you think and feel about yourself.

Over the next few weeks, we will share tips and avenues of support to help build confidence and self-esteem. We will also be holding the second in our **Mental Health and Wellbeing webinars** with Jenny Langley, from the Charlie Waller Trust. The session will be about **how to communicate with your child whatever their mood, and to boost their self-esteem & confidence.** More details to follow.

As for Profiling Days, vulnerable students are also able to attend school and our Student Welfare Team (SWT) will make contact with the parents of those students as appropriate. Students in receipt on free school meals will receive a voucher as before.
