WEEKLY LETTER FROM MS KATTIRTZI, HEADTEACHER

We have all been affected by the events that occurred in **Forbury Gardens on Saturday 20th June**, last week and our deepest sympathy and condolences go to the family and friends of the victims. Although we do not know the people that died, somehow the fact that one of them was a teacher made the situation very close to us. In response to the incident at Forbury Gardens we have been keen to do all we can to support our Kendrick community, all of whom have been affected in some way. In the updates students received from their TLCs at the start of the week, reflections on the incident were offered and students were reminded of how to access support should they need to. Our counsellor, Emma, has offered her ongoing support for students affected by the incident in any way and **Brighter Futures for Children** has set up a helpline for Reading families on **0118 937 2080**. Additional psychological support is also available so please do not hesitate to contact us if this would be helpful. Ms Stacey and I attended **Critical Incident Response** meetings with **Brighter Futures for Children** earlier in the week and have been able to identify some of our families who have been more directly affected by what has happened. Some of our Sixth Form students were taught by Mr Furlong at The Holt School before joining Kendrick or were present in the park at the time of the incident, and other students who live close to Forbury Gardens or the location of the raid on the suspect's flat on Basingstoke Road. We have been in touch with these students and families and offered our support.

The developments this week affecting schools have been about the easing of lockdown, in particular, social distancing and the reduction from two metres to one metre plus. Further measures will be needed if the ambition of the government that all children return to school in September is to be realised. Guidance from the government is expected next week which should set out plans for September. I hope that in next week's Weekly Update, I will be able to give some direction as to how school will end this term and begin next term. Also the support programme the government announced last week to provide 'catch up' is still to be clarified and schools are waiting to know how the £1billion will be distributed amongst schools. There is a growing feeling that 'catch up' is not the appropriate phrase that educationalists wish to use when describing the work and support that students may need as they return to school. There is a reference that we use more positive and encouraging language with our students and parents to demonstrate that we are building on what they have learnt and done during the lockdown period rather than viewing this period in seemingly negative terms. Motivation and encouragement for everyone must be what we need to do as we ease everyone back to more normal routines and life which is much more than 'catch up'. I hope everyone appreciates the distinctions here and I am sure government will also realise this in their future messaging.

Library News, our wonderful weekly digest of books compiled by our Librarians, which shares people's reading and suggests other books to read, features a super photo of our **crocheted Kendrick doll** who I only discovered this week when I went to the Library. The doll is called **Stella** and sits on the window ledge in the Library. She is supposed to depict a reading Kendrick student and her name **Stella** was given to her by a Year 10 student because she felt the name Stella, which derives from the Latin word 'star', seems an appropriate name for a Kendrick student who loves to read! I am sure it will be as enjoyable to watch as the first concert. Click here for a <u>link</u>. A group of Year 12 students: Mridhula, Arzina, and Ananya have successfully

got through to the final round of the **Schools' Aerospace Competition 2020.** In the project they aimed to improve the environmental impacts of tactical airlifters, by using a hybrid power system to reduce the carbon footprint of RAF operations. Although they will miss out on a week's residential at Cranfield this year, they will be invited next year. They have to make their final presentation virtually to a panel of experts on 29th July. We wish them well and feel very proud of their achievements. As I said last week Year 10 and 12 students will embark on their **virtual Work Experience programme** next **Wednesday –Friday 1st 3rd July**. All students in Year 10 and 12 should have received the materials for the online programme from **Mrs Rock, Work Related Learning Coordinator.**

The deadline for the last of our annual **Bursaries and Grants** that are available to our students is 30th June 2020. This new **STEM Bursary** sponsored by a parent and former governor is an award of £500 for a Year 13 students who wishes to explore an engineering or related technology course in her future plans. The details of the award scheme and application process is **here**.

I would like to end by remembering the victims of the attack last Saturday night in Forbury Gardens. All three men had family and friends who are now grieving for them. For us the fact that one of the victims was a local teacher, Mr James Furlong, who some of our own students knew and were taught by, makes the loss of this individual most profound for our community. The Co-Headteachers, **Ms Kennedy and Ms Pearce** of **The Holt School** spoke bravely and movingly in a tribute to their colleague and I would like to share some of their words with you as we end another week.

'James was a very kind and gentle man. He had a real sense of duty and cared for each and every one of our students....he truly inspired everyone he taught through his passion for his subject and his dedication. He was determined that our students would develop a critical awareness of global issues, and in doing so, (they) become active citizens and have a voice.'

How Should We Decide Which People from our Past to Commemorate?

There has been a great deal of discussion recently about monuments to Britain's past, such as the names of buildings and streets, and especially statues. You are probably aware of the protests which resulted in the statue of Edward Colston being pulled down in Bristol, and others being damaged elsewhere. People have put forward strong views on both sides of this debate.

The question of whether it is right to pull down statues of people from our past makes us ask interesting and difficult questions about why we put up statues of people in the first place. Mr Duncan, Subject Leader for Classics, and Mr Curran, Subject Leader for History, have been considering some of these questions and you can read their analysis here and here.

Rather than arguing about tearing down statues, we would like to invite you to consider why we should put them up in the first place. Imagine a situation where Kendrick has got five empty plinths on which we are going to put statues of people from history. Your challenge is to choose the five individuals, and to write up to 500 words to justify your choices. You need to think carefully about the individuals' achievements, attitudes and actions. What values and beliefs would it show that we at Kendrick hold to be important if we put up statues of those individuals? You could choose individuals who are already familiar to us and may appear in the school curriculum, or individuals from different cultures around the world who may not be well known in Britain.

This challenge is open to students in all year groups. A blank entry form is available for you to fill out, or you can submit your entry in your own format if you prefer. Entries should be sent by email to Mr Curran by Sunday 5th July 2020. Winning entries in each year group will be awarded with a prize! Good luck!
