Kendrick School Weekly Update Friday 5th June 2020

WEEKLY LETTER FROM MS KATTIRTZI, HEADTEACHER

Welcome back to everyone and welcome to Term 6 of this academic year. I hope everyone had a good half term and that the lovely weather helped make the restrictions of lockdown more bearable.

I want to begin this week by noting the tragic events that took place ten days ago in Minneapolis where Mr George Floyd, an African America was killed by the police in full view of the world. Understandably and quite rightly there has been outrage and disgust at this event, which happening alongside the COVID pandemic, has led many to say that there is a pandemic of racism that exists and is still deeply ingrained in institutions of America and elsewhere. The slogan **Black Lives Matter** is a rallying cry for all people of colour to say enough is enough and things must change. In our Kendrick community, where we are proud and continually emphasise our diversity and multi-cultural nature, there has been a display and outpouring of passion and indignation at what happened ten days ago in Minneapolis. Led by our Kendrick Student Leadership Team (KSLT), the feelings of them, and I believe our whole school community, were expressed in a post they sent to students and to me. The post is here and I hope that you read it and like me feel the power and strength of their feelings. As privileged young people, they are determined to stand up and fight against this racism with a determination and commitment so that no black life is destroyed again with such callousness and disregard. Deploying the words of our Kendrick Pledge, they have strongly challenged us all not to stand by and let such an atrocity happen again, but to stand up and do something about this blatant racism. I know that elsewhere in our school similar conversations are going on amongst students and staff and I am sure in people's homes too. Although we are not together at school, I truly feel that the bond that there is in our Kendrick community is united in the sympathy we all feel for the family of Mr Floyd and the feeling of outrage we all have at what happened to him. I feel so very proud of our Student Leadership team and our community and I thank them for being bold and brave in expressing their voices at this time.

As I said in my last Weekly Update on 22nd May, we are planning for the return of small groups of students in Years 10 and 12 from 15th June. To be clear, this will take place as follows:

- Group conversations are taking place between tutors and students this week and next. Based on these conversations staff will be assessing if certain students would benefit from coming into school for academic or pastoral support. If it is deemed that the needs of the students can be met in virtual group meetings, then teachers will continue to support students in virtual meetings as has been taking place since 20th March
- No more than 50 students will be in school at any one time
- Students will be invited into school for two hours a day: 9.00am-11.00am and 12.00pm 2.00pm. Added to that there will be an entry time so that students are received into school safely
- Students will sit in the larger classrooms in the school where appropriate social distancing is in place. Staff will come to them rather than students moving round the school. Rooms used in the morning will not be used in the afternoon and thorough cleaning will take place of all rooms at the end of each day
- We are saying at the moment that students should avoid using public transport to come to school and should either walk, if this is possible, or be dropped off by parents
- Up to 20 staff will be in school at any time one that students are in school to support with entry into school, reception, first aid, safeguarding, supervision, teaching
- Social distancing measures will be in place across the parts of the school where students will have access

- Permission from parents will be sought for students to return to school and parents have a responsibility to make sure that they only send their child into school if they are well. If a student becomes unwell whilst in school, parents will be contacted immediately to come to school to collect them.
- For students in Year 7, 8 and 9 and those who do not come to school in Years 10 and 12, there will be smaller group virtual sessions taking place. So that these smaller group session take place safely and with safeguarding in mind, we have drawn up some very careful safeguarding guidance. Please read the guidelines <u>here</u> carefully as we require everyone to adhere to them.
- Remote learning will continue for everyone for the rest of this term

As before, we will remain vigilant and responsive to the current situation and will adapt and change any of the above according to the instructions and guidance we receive from government. No student will be made to come to school.

Term 6 is always a very busy term. Although exams are not taking place, there are a number of key events that occur to prepare us for the next academic year. Within the constraints of lockdown we are planning our **transition programme for our new Year 7 and Year 12 students.** Although still in lockdown we are looking and planning to run as many of these events as we can through virtual meetings or by inviting small groups of people into school at any one time.

Other activities that engage our school community are being planned, including an **Anthology project** launched by Mr Nemeth, details of which were sent to students earlier in the week. **Music and creative activities** that Mrs Cooper has communicated to you about are also being planned. An important annual event at this time of the year that we still want to mark and celebrate despite being in lockdown is **Pride Month** which takes place in June, which is an opportunity for all of to celebrate and understand the diversity in our society and to show that we are an inclusive school community. As always, at the end of an academic year there are a few staff changes. I don't usually mention these until later in the term, however, I would like to mention one member of staff who will be leaving us at the end of this academic year. This is Ms Stacey, who this morning sent a message to all sixth form students to tell them about her plans for the future. Her presentation to them can be found <u>here</u>. Our new Head of Sixth Form from September 2020 will be Mrs Hearn and we congratulate her on her appointment. Mrs Hearn has worked in the sixth form team for the last four years and is well known to all students throughout the school. Between now and the end of term Mrs Hearn and Ms Stacey will be working closely together to make the transition as seamless as possible. Later in the term I will return to Ms Stacey's leaving and to other staff who will also be leaving this year to thank and acknowledge their individual and unique contribution to our school.

To finish this week, I would like to quote a part of the last paragraph of the KSLT post which reminds us all of our Kendrick Pledge:

Kendrick prides itself on its intolerance of prejudice, ignorance and injustice in all its forms and students strive to promote the values of equality, tolerance and justice for all. Therefore, it is absolutely necessary for us to act. It is essential that we educate ourselves on current world`issues, and raise our voices against said issues. Speak up when you hear or see something that is unjust and morally incorrect.
