Feminist of the Week

Arati Kumar-Rao, India

Photographer



Working across South Asia, independent photographer, writer and National Geographic Explorer Arati Kumar-Rao documents the changing landscape caused by climate change. She chronicles how drastically depleting groundwater, habitat destruction and land acquisition for industry devastate biodiversity and shrink common lands, displacing millions and pushing species towards extinction.

Kumar-Rao has crisscrossed the Indian subcontinent for over a decade, and her hard-hitting stories reveal how environmental destruction impacts livelihoods and biodiversity.

Her book, Marginlands: India's Landscapes on the Brink, encapsulates the experiences of

those living in India's most hostile environments.

"At the root of the climate crisis is the lamentable loss of our elemental connection with land, water and air. It is imperative that we reclaim this connection".

Book of the Week

Title: Pigeon English
Author: Stephen Kelman

Summary: Eleven-year-old Harrison Opoku, the second best runner in Year 7, races through his new life in England with his personalised trainers - the Adidas stripes drawn on with marker pen - blissfully unaware

of the very real threat around him.



Newly arrived from Ghana with his mother and older sister Lydia, Harri absorbs the many strange elements of city life, from the bewildering array of Haribo sweets, to the frightening, fascinating gang of older boys from his school. But his life is changed forever when one of his friends is murdered.

As the victim's nearly new football boots hang in tribute on railings behind fluorescent tape and a police appeal draws only silence, Harri decides to act, unwittingly endangering the fragile web his mother has spun around her family to keep them safe.

Female Scientist of the Week

Sasha Haco is an English theoretical physicist and entrepreneur. Haco received her PhD in Theoretical Physics from



the University of Cambridge in 2019. She spent a year as a visiting fellow at Cambridge from 2017 to 2018 and also spent a year at Harvard. In 2020, Haco was heavily featured in the Netflix documentary *Black Holes: The Edge of All We Know*, which chronicled the use of the Event Horizon Telescope to take the first photograph of a black hole, as well as the work of Haco, Hawking, Perry and Strominger as they attempted to better understand the black hole information paradox. Haco founded Ditto Software in 2018 and most recently cofounded Unitary, where she currently serves as the chief executive officer. Unitary works to develop tools to identify and moderate abusive online content. In 2021, Haco was honoured

with the Women in Innovation award recognizing her efforts addressing challenges in society.
