The Book Thief by Markus Zusak





Told from the unique perspective of Death, *The Book Thief* is a stunning and evocative masterpiece. Zusak's characters are courageous and authentic. His story focuses on everyday people enduring Nazi rule in a small town outside of Munich, the power of books and the written word. Frequently chilling and often heartbreaking, the novel does not shy away from describing the horrors of war; however, it ultimately champions the human spirit and its refusal to be cowed by evil. *The Book Thief* is a tale that will not be forgotten easily.

He says, 'World War II involved tens of millions of soldiers and cost sixty million lives, and Hastings ... provides a richly detailed single-volume history of the entire war. This week I wanted to share with you a book and TV series that resonated with me in my teens and went on to be the inspiration for my dissertation as part of my French Degree.

I think I watched the TV series first with my mum in the 1980s. It was about two women working for the British intelligence services during World War II. The agents were trained and deployed into service by Colonel James Cadogan who was willing to use any means necessary to meet the needs of his organisation: to transmit vital information on German activities to the intelligence network in London. I enjoyed it so much that I later picked up the

book and read it. I was so interested in the sacrifices that these women were making that I looked into women in the French Resistance whilst studying for a year at Lyon University and made it the subject of my dissertation.

As I couldn't find the book in my attic to pose for a photo I have included one of me in Lyon 1995/96 with my best friend!



Chris Tarrant and his father Basil were very close; they played sport together, watched sport together and shared the same sense of humour. Chris loved and admired his father but it was only after his death he realised that he hardly knew him at all.

Basil Avery Tarrant grew up in 1920s Reading, where the smell of beer and biscuits from the local factories filled the air. He worked as an administrator in a local factory and spent his Saturday nights down at the music halls. What happened to Basil during the war, and how he came to be awarded the Military Cross remained a mystery to Chris and his family for nearly sixty years.

In this emotional journey, Chris discovers that Basil was involved in some of WWII's most significant campaigns, including the Dunkirk evacuation and the D-Day landings and also took part in some of the most brutal, close-range fighting in Cleve.

Dad's War is a profoundly moving and heartfelt tribute to a much-loved father, but it's also a sincere and humble commemoration of the bravery and sacrifice of the soldiers of WWII. Thank you for this topical book suggestion Mrs. Hayhoe ©





Just for fun! Uncooked Chocolate Cake





This is a recipe from *We'll Eat Again* by Marguerite Patten OBE. The uncooked chocolate cake was something children could make themselves if they were old enough to melt the margarine in a saucepan. It tastes nice and chocolatey and could be topped with chocolate icing once it stood for a few hours to cool and harden. It doesn't have a cake consistency as the name suggests, but it was an easy-to-make sweet treat.

Ingredients

2oz margarine

2oz sugar

2 tablespoons of golden syrup or corn syrup

2oz cocoa

6oz crispy breadcrumbs

few drops of vanilla essence



Method

Put the margarine, syrup and sugar in a pan and melt gently over a low heat until the margarine is fully dissolved. Mix well.

Remove from the heat and add the vanilla essence and the cocoa. Mix thoroughly.

Pour in the breadcrumbs and stir until all coated with the mixture.

Press down into a 7 inch square greased tin.

Place somewhere cool for at least a few hours or until firm.

A topping can be added such as chocolate icing once cooled.

Once set, cut into squares (approximately 16).



We can draw some parallels to the rationing days during the war, as some of us struggle to get hold of essentials during this period of quarantine. At times items like eggs, flour & toilet rolls have been difficult to find; but imagine what it was like during the 1940s when you were only allowed one egg per person per week! The UK had the rationing system in place from 1940-1954.


