## Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) 2018/19

### Aim:

- To raise and support the attainment of students from low income families in receipt of Free School Meals (FSM) in order to address any underlying inequalities.
- To provide financial support for students from low income families in receipt of Free School Meals (FSM) in order to address any underlying inequalities.

### Expected Results:

- Improve the levels of attainment and progress for all qualifying students.
- To ease the financial burden of low income families and ensure students have equal access to educational visits, resources and other educational opportunities.

### Eligibility

- **Ever 6 FSM** –Students recorded in the January 2018 school census who are known to have been eligible for free school meals (FSM) in any of the previous 6 years (i.e. since summer 2012), as well as those first known to be eligible at January 2018.
- **Children adopted from care or who have left care** – students recorded in the January 2018 school census who were looked after by the Local Authority immediately before being adopted, or who left authority care on a special guardianship order or child arrangements order (previously residence order)
- **Ever 5 service child** – students recorded in the January 2018 school census who were eligible for the child premium in any of the previous 4 years (since January 2014 school census) as well as those recorded for the first time on the January 2018 school census.

### Pupil Premium Allocation:

- 2018/19 indicative allocation is £12,155. Actual 2018/19 allocation will be based on January 2018 census data and Free School Meals (FSM) history since 2012. This allocation may change once the January 2019 census has taken place and may be carried forward to future financial years.

Eligible students' progress will be monitored closely to identify any additional educational and/or financial support to prevent them falling below their targets and ensuring a wide provision of educational resources and opportunities are provided throughout the academic year.

### **Review of Pupil Premium Grant on Student Progress 2017/18**

During 2017/18 the 10 students eligible for Free School Meals and who triggered Pupil Premium were offered and used the available money to support their education by paying for items such as travel, trips and equipment.

Attainment and progress of disadvantaged students is very closely monitored on an individual basis as there are too few to be a statistically significant group.

## Conclusion

The progress data above for students eligible for PPG shows that attendance, effort and progress was overall very good. This is in line with the attendance and attainment of students not receiving PPG in their respective cohorts. Students are carefully tracked and monitored to ensure that key educational targets are met for each individual student. Students are well supported financially to experience a wide range of educational visits and obtain essential learning resources e.g. The Tempest and Bushcraft residential trip in Year 7, Multi Activity residential trip to Devon in Year 9 and attending modern foreign language plays and field courses in Year 10.

Kendrick School will continue to use the PPG in line with its policy for 2018/19
